Rationale for degree designation change:

The Department of Social Work is requesting a change in degree designation from the current Bachelor of Arts in Social Work (BA) to the Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) to align with national standards and credentialing influences.

Specifically, there is a move in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to license "BSW" level social workers. The National Association of Social Workers, legislative body representatives and the Pennsylvania Association of Undergraduate Social Work Education are cooperating in this endeavor. Ultimately, with licensure comes protection of the public by limiting certain employment offerings to professionally educated persons who are held accountable to generally recognized standards of performance. The WCU social work program must be compliant with the language of state legislation toward this outcome. Many employment advertisements already read "BSW preferred."

Further, the Council on Social Work Education, the national accreditation body, encourages program use of "Bachelor of Social Work." Many entry-level social work positions require a BSW. While the baccalaureate program in social work is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education, the faculty are frequently requested to write letters to prospective employers explaining that the BA in Social Work is equivalent to a BSW.

Within the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education, Shippensburg, Kutztown and Mansfield already offer BSW degrees. While there are undergraduate social work programs at Bloomsburg, California, Millersville and Slippery Rock that do not award a BSW, West Chester University, well-known throughout the state and nationally, should award the degree that is preferred by the Council on Social Work Education. Several private and state-related schools in the area award a BSW, for example Cabrini College, Eastern University, Temple University.

RATIONALE

The graduate certificate (comprised of 18 semester hours) in Emergency Preparedness in Public Health aligns with WCU's mission to have our graduate and postbaccalaureate programs be responsive to regional needs. The program builds on the faculty expertise within the Department of Health/School of Health Sciences and the professional network of area health professionals. This certificate also complements the Pennyslvania State System of Higher Education focus on science, technology and high need health programs.

After the attacks of September 11, 2001 and the following anthrax incidents across the nation, it has become clear that many employees, emergency personnel, educators, managers and public health professionals need to know how to prepare for and respond to public health emergencies of all kinds. The Public Health Security and Bioterrorism Preparation and Response Act (June 2002) notes the need for better education of professionals about how to protect workers and the public during emergencies. WCU is well suited to provide such training; this 18 semester hour graduate certificate can provide the necessary framework for establishing a cadre of well-informed, prepared professionals

There would be no additional resources needed to offer this certificate. The Department/University have adequate faculty resources/expertise and will also draw upon their extensive network of colleagues and regional infrastructure to assist in demonstrations to enhance the learning experiences of our students. Four of the required courses are existing courses and two additional courses were recently developed by the Department and approved by the local curriculum committee. All courses are 3 credits and offered by the Department of Health. The specific course titles are:

Rationale-Minor in Adapted Physical Activity

The minor in adapted physical activity is designed to go beyond the introductory level. The goals of the minor are to: A) enable WCU students to plan, implement, and advocate for, age appropriate and developmentally appropriate physical activity for people with a variety of physical and cognitive disabilities, in schools, fitness and recreation centers, and residential facilities, B) provide greater depth of knowledge about disability and C) develop and sharpen the skills and techniques of WCU students so that they are more effective while working with and developing programs for individuals with disabilities.

The minor in adapted physical education is open to students from any major. The minor is especially suited for the interests/career options of students in the career fields of health and physical education teacher certification, fitness specialists, and/or special education. Credentials available to students as a result of completing the minor include: Teacher of Adapted Aquatics, Teaching Assistant of Adapted Aquatics and Fitness Instructor for Individuals with Disabilities. Students in HPE-teacher certification will be eligible to sit for the APENS (Adapted Physical Education National Standards) exam. The minor consists of 15 credits of required courses in addition to 6 credits prerequisite courses for entrance in the minor. The required courses, each 3 credits are:

Rationale for name change:

The Department of Health is requesting a change in the title of the major by deleting the concentration name (BS in Public Health: Nutrition) and moving to the name Bachelor of Science in Nutrition and Dietetics (BS in Nutrition and Dietetics) in order to more accurately reflect the content and intent of this curriculum.

This evolution from a degree in public health with a concentration in nutrition to a Nutrition and Dietetics major will provide transcript recognition and more appropriately reflect the area of study. Currently, faculty often need to explain to prospective students and potential employers what content and skills set are represented in a BS Public Health: Nutrition curriculum. Under the current name (BS in Public Health: Nutrition), often students and high school guidance counselors do not associate the public health title with the nutrition and dietetics content.

The Department also believes the name change is needed to better align with the American Dietetics Association competencies for entry-level dietitians. This program has evolved from a public health emphasis to a primary focus of nutrition and dietetics and the new name aptly describes the major and focus.

Biographical Information for Lisa Scottoline

Lisa has written nine legal thrillers and is currently working on her next book, Dead Ringer, expected out in early Summer 2003. Dead Ringer stars Bennie Rosato, the no-nonsense owner of the law firm of Rosato & Associates, and is the book Lisa's readers have been asking for, a follow-up to the New York Times bestseller, Mistaken Identity. Lisa has been recognized by universities and organizations alike and is the recent recipient of both the "paving the way" award from Women in Business, and the "Distinguished Author Award" from Scranton University. All of Lisa's books draw on her experience as a trial lawyer as well as her judicial clerkships in the state and federal justice systems.

School

Lisa graduated magna cum laude (in three years, no less) from the University of Pennsylvania. Her B.A. degree was in English, with a concentration in the contemporary American novel, and she was taught writing by professors such as National Book Award Winner Phillip Roth. Lisa attended the University of Pennsylvania Law School, graduating cum laude in 1981, and clerked for a state appellate judge in Pennsylvania.

The Law

After the clerkship, she was a litigator at the prestigious law firm of Dechert, Price & Rhoads in Philadelphia. With the birth of a baby coinciding with the end of her marriage, Lisa decided to give up the law to raise her new daughter.

Thereafter

Broke anyway and with a living financed by five VISA cards, Lisa decided it was do-or-die-trying-time to become a novelist. She wrote while her infant slept, basing her first novel on her experiences as a lawyer in a large Philly law firm. It took three years to write that book (the baby didn't sleep much) and by the time it was finished, the baby was in school and her debt-ridden mother had taken a part-time job clerking for a federal appellate judge.

A week later, that novel, Everywhere That Mary Went, was bought by editor Carolyn Marino at HarperCollins, and Lisa had a new career on her hands. Everywhere That Mary Went was nominated for the Edgar Award, the premiere award in suspense fiction by the Mystery Writers of America, and lest you think this is a Cinderella story, lost the award. Lisa's second novel, Final Appeal was nominated for an Edgar the very next year and won.

Lisa's subsequent novels, Running From the Law, Legal Tender and Rough Justice received starred reviews in Kirkus and Publishers Weekly. Rough Justice was People Magazine's "Page-Turner of the Week" and Legal Tender was chosen as Cosmopolitan magazine's premier book club selection.

In addition to receiving starred reviews from Publishers Weekly and Kirkus, Mistaken Identity was Lisa's first New York Times bestseller. In its paperback edition the book went all the way to #5 on The List. Another starred review from Publishers Weekly created early buzz for Moment of Truth and it became an instant national bestseller. As it turned out, both Mistaken and Moment were on the paperback and hardcover New York Times bestseller lists simultaneously.

Named one of "The Ten Best Best Mysteries of the Year" by the Ft. Lauderdale Sun-Sentinel, The Vendetta Defense appeared on all the major national and local bestseller lists. At the same time, the paperback edition of Moment of Truth became an instant New York Times bestseller. Hailed as a "sexy summer read" by Cosmopolitan Magazine, Courting Trouble became a beach reading favorite of 2002, and immediately jumped onto the New York Times bestseller list. It stars rookie lawyer Anne Murphy, a gorgeous, daring and fashion-conscious redhead, who, with a "lack of impulse control," brings more to the all-female law firm than anyone bargained for. A native Philadelphian, Lisa is happily remarried and lives with her family in the Philadelphia area. Her books have been translated into over twenty languages.

Background:

Jim Rubillo is currently the executive director of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics. NCTM is the world's largest professional association dedicated to a single discipline. The over-ridding goal of the Council's 110,000 members is to provide better mathematics instruction to all of North America's children.

Mr. Rubillo has been a mathematics teacher and college administrator for over 37 years. During the 2000-2001 academic year, he served as a professor of mathematics at DeSales University in Center Valley, Pennsylvania. In the prior 30 years he served Bucks County Community College in a variety of roles including professor of mathematics, associate dean for information systems and services, executive assistant to the president for planning assessment and research, and chairperson of the department of mathematics and computer science. Prior to his college service, Mr. Rubillo was a high school teacher and department chair. Mr. Rubillo is an adjunct faculty member in the Graduate Schools of DeSales University and Widener University.

Mr. Rubillo has been an active professional leader and educational consultant. He regularly conducts K-12 in-service programs for schools and school districts on a variety of mathematics education topics. He has served as a consultant for many corporations in the areas of total quality management, statistical process control, and project management.

Mr. Rubillo is an active leader in mathematics education. He has served as a member of the Boards of Directors of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) and the National Council of Supervisors of Mathematics (NCSM). From October 1997 through April 1998, Jim served as the Interim Executive Director of NCTM. He is a Past President of the Association of Teachers of Mathematics of Philadelphia and Vicinity (ATMOPAV) and the Bucks County Council of Teachers of Mathematics (BCCTM). Mr. Rubillo has published numerous articles in professional journals. He currently serves on the boards of directors of the Conference Board of Mathematical Sciences, and the Mathematical Sciences Education Board.

Mr. Rubillo is a frequent speaker at professional meetings on the local, state, and national level. To date, he has made over 575 invited presentations in 49 states and 7 Canadian provinces. He has presented keynote addresses at many professional conferences including: The National Council of teachers of Mathematics, the American Mathematics Association of Two Year

Colleges, the Northwest Mathematics Conference, Association of Teachers of Mathematics in New England, as well as at many NCTM regional conferences.

Mr. Rubillo has received many professional awards. He received the Outstanding Contributions to Mathematics Education Award from the Association of Teachers of Mathematics of Philadelphia and Vicinity in 1998, and the Outstanding Contribution to Mathematics Education Award of the Pennsylvania Council of Teachers of Mathematics in 1999. He was awarded the Faculty Professional Achievement Award by the Bucks County Community College Alumni Association in 2000. Upon his retirement from Bucks County Community College, he was awarded the title of Professor Emeritus. In May 2000, Mr. Rubillo received the Pennsylvania Council of Teachers of Mathematics' Hall of Fame Award. However his proudest recognition was being named a Distinguished Alumnus by West Chester University in 1990.

Mr. Rubillo received a Bachelor of Science degree from West Chester University, and a Masters degree from Villanova University. He has also studied at Temple University and the University of Illinois.

Lawrence Dining Hall Expansion

Analysis of Existing Needs and Proposed Solutions:

According to the most recent State System of Higher Education Space Guidelines, West Chester University's Auxiliary Dining Services have a 53,217 sf shortage in food service space. As a result, the existing facilities at Lawrence Dining Center are seriously overcrowded. In addition, campus dining services nationwide have undergone serious market changes in recent years. Institutional-type serving and seating areas no longer satisfy the average student. Today's student desires a "branded concept" retail food service, late-night diner motifs, or a grab-and-go retail concept. Lastly, the new student housing being constructed on campus, even with the eventual decommissioning of Ramsey Hall, will result in increased food service usage.

The Dining Auxiliary proposes to address some of these needs by constructing a 17,650 square foot addition to Lawrence Dining Center (see the attached map). This addition will be situated in the lower exterior entrance court, what is now considered the "front" of Lawrence Dining Center.

Specific items included in this addition are:

- A first floor food area based on a "branded concept" design.
- A first floor access food area designed around a diner motif. This diner area will be situated to permit after-hours access to the students for late night dining options.
- Multi-style dining seating incorporating booths, tables, chairs, lounge chairs, etc, for approximately 250 students.
- Relocation and limited expansion of the existing Convenience Store.
- Provision of approximately 6,200 square feet of Housing administrative spaces located on the upper floor.
- Upgrade/modification to existing rear loading dock/delivery area to address maintenance and repair issues and to provide improved "face" to neighboring community.

Cost

Construction Cost - \$3.3M (calculated using State System allowable cost guidelines)
Project Cost - \$4.6M (includes contingency, design, furnishings, and management costs)
Total Bond Amount – Approximately \$5M; will re-determine at mid-point of design

Student Fee Increase

Debt service is anticipated to be approximately \$380,000 per year, which is a 1.5% fee increase. Operating costs which include maintenance and lifecycle replacement costs are anticipated to require a 1.2% fee increase. Therefore, the anticipated overall increase for students is 2.7%. This fee increase is already included in the 6.7% fee increase requested for 2003-2004.

Neighbor Relations


The University's preliminary plans for this dining expansion were discussed with a small group of community members and their reaction was positive. We expect the community will be pleased with the proposed alterations to the loading dock. Since the addition faces the interior of campus, the adjacent community will not be subjected to any drastic changes along their street fronts. Lastly, this project does not create any substantial parking needs or generate much additional traffic, a constant concern for many of residents in the area near campus.

University Community Reaction to Project

The concept for adding dining space has been shared with several different groups around the University in addition to students, and the general reaction has been very favorable. The students have heard about the programming ideas and seem very interested in how it will improve the dining climate on campus. Additionally, the students are pleased with the fact that this facility will offer extended operating hours during the late-night time frame, and are excited with the notion that they could combine studying at night with dining.

LAWRENCE CENTER DINING EXPANSION LOAN COVENANT AGREEMENT

On March 13, 2003, the Council of Trustees of West Chester University of Pennsylvania approved the acquisition of an auxiliary facilities project to consist of construction of a 17,650 square-foot dining hall expansion to the existing Lawrence Center Dining Hall.

West Chester University of Pennsylvania wishes to secure financing for this project from the State System of Higher Education of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. In so doing, the University agrees to:

Establish, collect, and remit fees from the appropriate students in an amount sufficient to satisfy the debt service payments as determined on behalf of the Board of Governors and to fund the annual operating and life cycle maintenance, repair, and renovation costs for auxiliary-funded projects; or to commit sufficient operating funds or Key '93 appropriated funds as applicable for infrastructure and land improvement projects, deferred maintenance projects, or other facilities projects as approved by the Board of Governors.
